Ham Fen is the last surviving fen in Kent, and she will take us on a 2-hour walking tour and hear all about the project to reintroduce beaver to the site. You'll learn about the once native beaver, which were reintroduced to the site in 2001 as part of Kent Wildlife Trust's plans to create a wilder Kent. You'll look for evidence of these 'water engineers' at the fen and find out about their ability to slow running water, create pools and marshes, and the benefits this has started having on the landscape and other wildlife at the reserve.

Thank you to those in the community who came to the information meeting regarding the District Plan, we hope it was helpful and you were able to lodge your concerns with the council.


Work is also going on to improve and update our web site so it can be informative and easy to use by the public and members. Watch this space!

#### Community Group calls for Safer Roads for Walmer

On Friday 25<sup>th</sup> November many residents met at Walmer Parish Hall for a meeting called by James Walmesley and Vernon Recas of Walmer Road Safety Group, although the weather was miserable and there was the World Cup match on the TV!

Three of the speakers they invited to attend were there to answer questions from residents. Alan Watson, an organizer of Kent Speed Watch, cllr Mike Eddy of Walmer Town Council and cllr Trevor Bond, who represents Middle Deal on DDC and Deal & Walmer on KCC.

Many residents expressed their disappointment that developers are not made to pay for pavements, crossings, road cushions and road infrastructure that would mitigate the increased dangers their buildings bring with them. Campaigners Tony Grist and Sarah Gleave pointed out that with over 30,000 residents in Walmer and Deal now, the access roads used by emergency vehicles needed to be made a lot safer, there had been near misses and a fatality only last week. Alan Watson urged residents to report incidents to the Kent Police so that there are more prosecutions for dangerous behaviour

www.kent.police.uk/area/your-area/kent/dover/walmer/contact-us/top-reported-crimes-in-this-area Cllr Bond promised he would continue to press Kent Police for more action and to urge Kent Highways to put in road safety measures. Many residents asked for 20mph speed limits on residential streets and Cllr Mike Eddy said that Walmer Council agreed 20mph limits would make residential streets safer. He said this and other measures were in the Walmer Council HIP (Highways Improvement Plan) and they were urging higher level councils, DDC and KCC responsible for planning and highways respectively, for 20mph limits. Residents and the chair of Walmer Council together agreed they would respond to the Local Plan and urge DDC to put a stop to the overdevelopment that will bring over 1000 more cars onto very congested roads. #### Kingsdown Village—Jane Banks & Sharon Morris

Third part of three part history—continued from December/January

The original Kingsdown School Logbook is a fascinating read and is available to view at the Maidstone Archives.

The Curlings also financed the building of the schoolteacher's house (now Old School House), the church of St John the Evangelist, and the rectory.

Following William Curling's death in 1855, Elizabeth gave the school premises to the church (conveyance of 30th July 1856) who were then responsible for managing the school (including appointing the teachers) until the 1930s.




Jimmy Smith, who ran the paper shop is middle row right, next to the teacher

Education was made compulsory to age 15 in 1944, and so education moved from the control of the church to the Ministry of Education. The schools – both infant and junior – were finally closed on 31st December 1937 after a disastrous government inspection. The school kept the title deeds to the land.

After that date, the villagers used the building as a meeting venue for local societies. It was used as a NAFFI for the troops during WW2. However, the Ministry of Education insisted on the sale of the property in 1950, (it still had no electricity supply) so the Diocese sold the land and the building to the Parochial Church Council, (or rather to two local individuals namely Mr Stanley Player Mitchell and Mr Cecil Osmond Youden) who purchased it with a mortgage of £250 with the intention of letting it to the village at a peppercorn rent under a 99-year lease. After both legal and financial advice, and then agreement from the PCC, the land and the schools were sold to the people of the village, complete with £200 still to pay on the mortgage, and the property was invested in the Public Trustee of Charity Lands.

The PCC insisted on various conditions, including the name of the hall – St John's Village Hall, Kingsdown. The PCC stipulated that the hall was to be managed by a committee and

run by the village for the village, but they insisted that the church could use the hall on Sundays and Good Fridays. The hall's governing document, the Deed of Trust, includes these clauses today.

On 1st April 1952, the first AGM was held, and the building was opened as a village hall. The village hall secretary, Miss Sybil Crocker, read a letter from a local benefactor who wished to remain anonymous, in which he said he donated the sum of £200 to pay off the mortgage on the hall, and another letter from Mr Gerald Hardman (solicitor) saying he had paid off all the interest and legal charges. The generous gifts made the hall the property of the village absolutely. The building and the cost of additional kitchens and cloakrooms was also cleared and completed in 1954. The property was vested in the Public Trustee of Charity Lands. charity (number 302777).

Unlike Ringwould Village Hall (which was built in 1934 on land owned by the Parish Council donated to them by the Monins Estate), Kingsdown's hall and the land it is built on, belongs to the village.

A picture of HM the Queen was bought in 1955. This was generously restored by a villager in 2014. In 1957, the minutes record a tribute to the retiring Hon Secretary Miss S. Crocker for all she had done for the hall with such untiring enthusiasm and efficiency. The first Chairman, Col Farrier said he doubted whether the Village Hall would have been acquired without Miss Crocker's efforts. The present Trustees are the successors of those very first Trustees.

The original Village Hall Committee minutes from 1950 to 1999 have been transcribed and are available in digital format. Unfortunately, and despite extensive enquiries, all official hall data from 1999 to 2007 cannot be traced. It is believed all these minutes were lost during the refurbishment of 2010. Records from 2007-2020 are available as both hard and digital copies.

#### The Church

The church of St John the Evangelist was built and endowed in 1850 by W.Curling Esq at a cost of £6000. It was Elizabeth Curling who selected the site that the church was to be built on – the site of a beacon for ships. The 'Morning Post' describes a 'procession of 1000 persons and 100 invited guests passing through a triumphal arch decorated with flowers on its way from the school' for the laying of the foundation stone by William Curling on May 4th, 1849. Building work was completed 13 months later, and the Church of St John the Evangelist was consecrated. William died in 1855, three years after the church was finished.

A fence was erected in 1964 between Old School House and the hall, the owner also serving as chair for many years until the advent of a playgroup. In the last 66 years, successions of local societies have used the village hall. These include the WI, The Garden Society, The Angling Club, Youth Club, Boys Club, Girls Club, Child Welfare Clinic, the County Library, the Devine School of Dancing, Darby and Joan Club, Civil Defence, Mothers Union, nursery, playgroup, whist club, the Parish Council, Table Tennis Club, Preschool, Sunday School, and group meetings. Since 1952, the hall has been used by the community for events such as jumble sales, coffee mornings, street parties and private hire.

The support of the village is key to its continued success, so long may this tradition continue!

This history was researched by two former Trustees in 2018.

# Focus on LOCAL PETS



Sylvia Main started keeping donkeys in 1983, with the intention of keeping the grass down in her garden. Initially, she had two donkeys one named Violeta and the other named Thistle. Both donkeys had foals and Sylvia decided to keep Fiona who was the offspring of Violetta. Eventually Fiona was left alone, and Sylvia felt it would be good to have another donkey to keep Fiona company, that was about 6 years ago. Sylvia visited the donkey sanctuary at New Romney and decided to adopt Jacob. Sadly, Fiona has now died, and Sylvia only has Jacob. Jacob is about 25 years old. Donkeys can live to a ripe old age (Fiona was 37 years old when she died).

The male donkey is known as a jack, or a jackass and a female is known as a jenny or jennet, and they originate from Africa. Donkeys vary considerably in size de-

pending on the breed and environmental conditions. The loud call or bray (hee haw) from a donkey can be heard up to 3 kilometres away. Donkeys have large ears which may pick up more distant sounds and may help to cool the donkeys' blood. Donkeys' hooves are more elastic than those of horses and do not wear

down as fast, therefore they may need clipping.

Donkeys cannot live outdoors all year in Britain as their coats are not water proof.

Jacob has a stable which is warm and dry. He spends most of his days eating grass, but in winter his diet is supplemented with hay. He is fed morning and evening. He enjoys eating carrots and apples and he also enjoys chewing on bark. However, it is not good for people to feed him their scraps as it can upset his stomach. It requires about a quarter acre of land minimum to sustain one donkey. Jacob features at the Easter Sunday procession at St John's church and can often be seen grazing in the church yard.

- A donkey is stronger than a horse of the same size
- Donkeys can see all four of their feet at the same time
- Donkeys can vary hugely in size, from 26 inches to 68 inches tall
- A donkey's bray can carry up to 60 miles in the desert
- Donkeys have incredibly efficient digestive systems, utilising 95% of what they eat
- Donkeys don't like being in the rain for long periods as their fur is not waterproof
- Donkeys have been used as working animals for at least 5,000 years.
- A blind donkey will often bond with a seeing donkey who will act as their guide
- Donkeys can be a calming influence on other animals
- Donkeys are very clever with a keen sense of curiosity
- Donkeys are not stubborn but can be reluctant to do anything that might be unsafe - they consider situations before deciding what to do
- Donkeys are extremely nimble and can cross tricky terrain
- Donkeys are very sociable and form strong bonds you will often see pairs of best friends within a herd
- Donkeys are different to horses in their physiology, communication, thinking and behaviour - they do their best with other donkeys as companions.

The next meeting which will take place on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> February 2023 at 7.30pm – The Church Hall, East Studdal.



#### **Council Tax News January 2023**

2022 ended with the VOA head office accepting that atriums should be measured from the ground floor only. A battle won for those with central atriums around the staircase who were paying council tax for non existent floor areas.

2023 is the government's final opportunity to persuade the electorate that life under the conservatives is better than life under labour. Those readers who are long term council tax payers will no doubt recall that council tax was first levied in April 1993 and is a tax on the dwelling based upon its capital value in April 1991. The liability to pay the tax is that of the occupier of the dwelling not the owner.

Band D homes were said to be worth between £68,001 to £88,000 in April 1991, which in Kingsdown tend to be older and smaller dwellings, the average charge in 1993 for a Band D home was £568 per annum because the conservative government applied transitional relief to mitigate the increase from rental value to capital value under the new system.

November 1994 the opportunity to appeal the band ended.

March 1995 the transitional relief ended.

April 1995 Council Tax was charged in full approximately £609 for Band D.

This months council tax news looks at how the money paid as council tax is spent.

In 1995 the cost of running the local services, including:-

police and fire services

leisure and recreation projects, such as maintaining parks and sports centres libraries and education services

rubbish and waste collection and disposal

transport and highway services, including street lighting and cleaning, and road maintenance

environmental health and trading standards

administration and record-keeping, such as marriages, deaths and birth, and local elections.

Plus 100% of the parish council expenditure was covered up to 50% by the council tax and business rates. Councils such as DDC collected local business rates but were only allowed to retain 50%. Part of the shortfall was made up by an increase in council tax.

June 1997 Tony Blair won the election when council tax for Band D was £688. One of Tony Blairs flagship policies was public sector reform including council tax April 1998 Council Tax for band D increased by 8.6% to £747

In 2003 the increase was 12.9% and for the first time the annual charge topped £1000 for Band D.

Tony Blair set up a committee of finance experts, academics and council leaders to carry out a review of local taxation. By then council tax covered only 25% of local expenditure.

In 2007, the first revaluation of dwellings since 1993 was due to be carried out. One reform considered was to extend the number of bands from 8 to 10 to reflect the house price inflation. Tony Blair resigned in June 2007 before taking steps to action any plan.

At which point band D council tax had increased to £1321 per annum.

This increase of £574 since 1997 for a band D dwelling has no connection with the value of the dwelling. The demand is based solely on the sum estimated by Dover DC etc to meet the costs of providing the services for the coming year

Gordon Brown's fiscal policies saw council tax increase from £1373 in 2008 to £1439 in 2010 when the Conservatives returned to government and the average Band D charge was frozen at £1439 for the first time in 2011. Parliament decreed that local authorities wishing to increase the council tax charge above 2% had to hold a referendum. The Police and Crime Commissioner was introduced in 2012 and became an additional charge on the council tax payer. The annual charge increased to £1444 for 201.

In 2016 the conservative government decreed that dover council tax payers should contribute an additional 3% towards the costs incurred by Kent County Council in providing social care to adults. This additional council tax charge is ring fenced and to be used only for adult social care.

This precept is in addition to Dover District Council having the power to increase council tax by an additional 2% in 2016-17.

The total KCC precept for Band D homes in Kingsdown was £1,133.55 (£1,111.77 + £21.78).

In 2016 the 3.1 % overall increase made the charge for the average Band D dwelling  $\pounds$ 1530

In 2017-18 the total precept charged by KCC for adult social care was £1,178.82 (£1,134.36 + £44.46)

2018-19 the total precept was £1,237.68 (£1,169.64 + £68.04)

2019-20 the government allowed an increase by up to 2%, the total precept was £1,299.42 (£1,206.72 plus £92.70)

In 2020-21 adult social care authorities were able to increase council tax by an additional 2 per cent to fund adult social care making the total precept £1,418.76 (£1,259.64 plus £159.12)

In 2022 the council tax demand for Band D has increased further to include Kent County Council £1,287.99 2.0% increase 11% goes to Kent Police Adult Social Care Precept\* £173.25 1.0% increase

The Police and Crime Commissioner for Kent £228.15 4.6% increase

Dover District Council £202.14 2.5% increase

Kent & Medway Fire & Rescue Authority £82.35 1.9% increase

Ringwould with Kingsdown Parish Council £42.43 -0.2% decrease

The above Parish/Town precept supports total spending of £43,600.00 for Ringwould with Kingsdown Parish council.

Annual charge for a Band D property: £2,016.31 = 3.0% increase overall

In 2016 KCC received £1,111.77 + £21.78 adult social care for every Band D dwelling In 2022 KCC received £1.287.99 + £173.25



#### New East Kent campaign group: Kent Deserves Democracy

On 3<sup>rd</sup> Oct 2022 many residents of our Walmer and Deal area, turned up at the Astor Theatre, to hear speakers with a national reputation speak about how fair proportional voting could break the grip of big lobby groups (private healthcare corporations, big property developers, big fossil fuel corporations, etc) and provide the 67million UK population with cleaner, more accountable government.

The current problematic system is the epitome of an unlevel playing field, with many safe seats and unaccountable MPs, with privileged access to some media outlets. 43.6% of the two-thirds who voted in 2019, gave 100% of power to a party with 56% of parliamentary seats. The hope of many, included some ex-Conservatives, is that any incoming parliamentary majority at the next general election would consult and bring in a fair proportional voting system with both strong constituency links and a close match between share of votes cast and share of seats won, and encourage more people to vote.

The hope is that fairer voting could also be brought in for regional govt like Kent County Council, so that councillors might be more accountable, keener to heed residents in order to earn their £15K allowances, instead of always voting as instructed by party leaders.

At the Astor on the 3<sup>rd</sup> the big speakers at the event were, Gavin Esler, broadcaster and author, Tom Brake, director of Unlock Democracy, and Neal Lawson, director of Compass. Three local campaigners from local parties who also spoke about their hopes for better, fairer government were Sarah Gleave, Jo Rothery and Penelope James of Greens, Labour and LibDem respectively.

It plans a number of actions in the new year, and can offer a talk with powerpoint on how councils function in Kent to community groups.
