In the latter case, the Member may only participate on the same basis as a member of the public and cannot participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter and must withdraw from the meeting in accordance with the Council's procedure rules.

Being the nations most loved wildflower, our **English Bluebells Bulbs (Hyacinthoides Non Scripta)** present long tubular violet-blue flowers with reflexed tips that carries a delightful honey fragrance that bees find irresistible.

Flowering between April and June, these beautiful varieties of **bluebells in the green** enjoy cool, partially shaded areas with a rich woodland type of soil. For best results, plant 10cm below soil and 10cm apart.

The Walmer In Bloom garden campaign has only a short number of criteria for a garden or green space to be considered or nominated. Any space considered needs to be within the boundaries of the parish and will be designated as within one of the three areas for judging.

- Lower Walmer
- Middle Walmer
- Upper Walmer

When judged the green spaces in Walmer are further broken down for consideration for final judging, these are as follows.

Non Winners- These are the green spaces that are liked by the judges but are not deemed as suitable for consideration as winners.

- Highly Commended Certificate
- Certificate of Excellence

Winners- The winner categories were broken down into one of five categories combined with the area they are designated.

•	Best Wildlife Friendly Garden	Lower/Middle/Upper Walmer
•	Best Use of Small Space	Lower/Middle/Upper Walmer
•	Best Container	Lower/Middle/Upper Walmer
•	Best Garden	Lower/Middle/Upper Walmer
•	Best Business	Lower/Middle/Upper Walmer

In 2024 a further category was used by the WIB committee Judges

Best Hanging Basket
 Lower/Middle/Upper Walmer

This year also included the first use of nominations by members of the public that believe that a green space they have see was worthy of consideration. While only a handful made nominations, they were seen by the members and judged accordingly.

Areas of Achievement

The Walmer in Bloom Garden competition is still going strong. There are 6 members of the group who walk sections of the Parish and view all the gardens, quite an effort carried out over 4 days. If the garden they are viewing looks very good and a worthy contender then a commended certificate is left with the resident thanking them for the pleasure that the garden is bringing to the area. There are four categories for the competition – Garden, Containers, Best use of a small space and a Wildlife Garden Award. Sue and Louise who were showing me around said that they have both had residents tearful and so appreciative of the simple gesture of an A5 certificate and the short explanatory note that accompanies it. The Certificate incorporates a child's art drawing to illustrate the current years 'In Bloom' efforts. The image is a competition for all school children in the Parishes two primary schools and as such involved parents and their children, a great way to get the message out to young families who would otherwise possibly not be aware of it. The public reaction to the certificates shows how treasured they are. It's quite an effort but obviously works well. It's a very professional approach as well using an external RHS judge to decide the final winners. The Parish Council provide 54 baskets and have 24 planters. There is agreement that in the long term these need to be more sustainable but Walmer is a seaside town and flower attractiveness needs to be evident to keep residents engaged. There are significant changes taking place however and I was shown the Peace Garden. A hidden undeveloped space in the residential urban area but with some good mature trees that had been threatened with development at one stage recently. The Town Council and residents have responded by ensuring that it is a haven for wildlife with a mix of meadow and pocket planting. The grass areas are showing good promise as future flower meadows and there is good management of the paths to give people in the area access around the site. It is not signed and is a hidden gem for those nearby. The other site I remember from a previous visit is Hawkshill Freedown which has a superb grassland meadow. The paths are wide and well planned out with a regular number of people using the site. Views and its $^\prime$ historic past make this an interesting site and it links directly into the back woodland area of Walmer Castle who have been liaising with the Walmer Council to recreate a historic view that existed in the past heydays of the Castle. I saw this later that day from the Castle side and I applaud your work to recreate this view even though sadly some tree work is required. But once recreated it will only require maintenance. David who kindly informed me for some length on the various aspects of the site says there is a regular working group of 6 volunteers every Sunday and they liaise with 6 other groups delivering activities and facilities it appears on the site. The Scouts did a Spring Watch on the site and there is a link with Dover Grammar School. There are 7 seats placed around the site for local people to take a moment to enjoy the beauty of the site. The Moth night sounded a brilliant idea and seems was well supported and recorded some very good numbers and types of moth. I was fascinated by the idea of Bee bombs—seeds given free to residents that offer those interested the knowledge that the seeds are bee friendly plants without having to worry or choose seeds that they may not be familiar with. The recycling bins that allow recycling to take place in public areas is great to see and full marks to the Walmer Town and Dover District Council for undertaking this. It was often an element that was missing in town waste bin collection systems. Also full marks for working with Pick Deal Cleanwhat a great community effort. Add in the Cycling, tree planting and allotment support there is a lot happening and it was greatly appreciated, well done to all concerned and keep up the good work.

Areas for Development

The Hawkshill Freedown meadows need to be managed to reduce the nutrient levels. At present there is a good diversity of grass species and a number of flowering meadow species. I do not recall if Rattle is present but this is a good species to try and introduce I am told. Also the autumn cut and collect is I believe essential to the long term improvement of the area. The Head Gardener of Walmer Castle has recently been on a course on Meadow Management and I believe would be very helpful if you could initiate a contact. The tree planting was good to see and to hear that watering is planned. With the strange high temperatures and long dry spells we seem to be having on occasions I would suggest very very heavy mulching of new trees. A depth of 30-45cm woodchip to a distance of 50-75cm away from the stem. Avoid piling directly up against the tree stem but this will if applied in the winter provide a cooling to the ground and retain soil moisture much longer and also allow extra watering to percolate easier into the tree base. I also believe there is as yet to be proved mycorrhizal fungi activity that this initiates and helps new roots take up nutrients. I do wonder if there is an area that could be investigated for the future and that is the edge of the shingle beach. The footpaths that are extremely popular and also offer a cycleway on the promenade do have a number of native flowering plants such as valerian, horn poppy and mallow. I have often wondered if there is potential here for the odd pocket of native plants to be encouraged and helped to establish.
