Salisbury Road out side of old Walmer Secondary school

Details of issue

Location

Concern about parking, one the school is reopened as the Beacon School. Currently there are issues with parking as contractors have been parking on the roads. Resident is concerned about the parking on the road once the school has been completed as well as the increase in traffic in peak times. Resident requested a parking permit scheme.

Information from KCC or requirements

In the planning application a specialist company was contracted to complete a survey of the highway. Thes result of this is that as a specialist school there is likely to be less foot traffic from the school with more travel by car and bus, the new designs include a pick up lane inside the grounds for buses and cars to collect pupils. The review of projected traffic indicated that due to the smaller size of the school there was a lower, than when previously a school, level of traffic expected. Double yellow lines have been inspected by DDC and are acceptable, KCC have inspected other road markings.

KCC have indicated that they are not willing do put any further double yellow lines down at this point as the survey indicates that this is not required. DDC have refused a permit scheme as the majority of houses already have off road parking.

Details of issue

Lack of disabled specific parking. Resident was enquiring about allocating disabled spaces on the triangle part of Canada Road, this is specifically due to disabled members of the sailing club having issues with parking near the club.

Information from KCC or requirements

KCC and DDC have been contacted by the resident both sent the resident to the other authority. Put resident in touch with the Joint transport board who would look at items such as this. We are aware of limited parking for residents in this area of Walmer.

Location Dover Road Upper Walmer

Details of issue

Speeding cars coming down the hill. Pavements are narrow and trucks coming along Dover Road which are wider, risking wing mirrors clipping pedestrians. Resident is interested in making this a 20mph zone. Wingham has just had a 20mph zone set up on the main road to Canterbury.

Information from KCC or requirements

Kent police state that any 20mph zone should be self policing, Wingham were able to set the 20mph zone in part because the average speed was already below 30mph due to the layout of the road, any attempt to secure a 20mph zone would likely require more work than just signage to make it acceptable to KCC. Cllr Grist is working with a group of residents from Dover Road to gauge public opinion. Speedwatch has been active in the area however there are minimal records of speeding. Speed cameras are unlikely to be granted with Government Guidance stating that for a fixed speed camera site over a 36 month period a 3 incidents of serious injury would need reporting. Currently on the crash map there is only one report and that is down by the Thompson Bell.

Location James Hall Gardens

Details of issue

Cars parking on the junction (see below), residents write of concern having to creep in to Downs Road from the Junction with James Hall Gardens due to parked cars limiting sightlines.

Information from KCC or requirements

Rule 250 of the highway code states cars may not park within 10m (32 ft) of a junction, this while not a must not rule can lead to a non endorsable penalty if it is considered to be causing an obstruction to the sight lines of pedestrians or drivers. Parking in the area is limited and particularly during school opening closing is insufficient for the number of cars. In both cases in the photos the car on the junction is not the issue to the sightlines but it is the next car along meaning the yellow lines would need to go on to Downs Road to allow sightlines to improve. Dover District Council have been contacted and with no road markings these are currently unenforceable. DDC suggestion would be to take these as far as Hershall Road west and similar distance in the other direction. This would lose approximately 3 spaces on either side of the road and 1 or 2 on James Hall Gardens

Item: Walmer Station.

Date: 13/2/25.

Meeting: February 2025 Amenities and Environment.

The council received correspondence from a member of the public about the opening times of Walmer Train Station and the lack of facilities open throughout the day.

The stations themselves are owned by network rail but operated by the regional service provider in this case Southeastern. Both Southeastern and Network rail are controlled by the Department of Transport. Southeastern were moved to be under Government control in 2017, following failures on the part of the previous franchisee, as an operator of last resort.

Walmer Station is not located in the busiest part of Walmer and as such there are minimal facilities locally. The member of the publics complaint about the station is the lack of toilet facilities and the exposure to the weather when the station is closed (station is open 6.30am-11.00am Mon-Sat). The station was locked outside of these hours in 2001 following vandalism to the station. The nearest public toilets would be either Marke Wood or Granville Road which is approximately a 20 min walk. There is a Café or Pub some 10 minutes away on Dover Road which if open will have Toilets and refreshments, this requires accurate information as to when delayed trains will arrive to be able to make use of.

The Member of public refers to a station in Hollingbourne where the local council have been able to assist in keeping the station open, this was a grant to a local who set up a business within the station, we at this time have had no requests for such grants.

It should be noted that approximately 2 years ago Southeastern were looking to permanently close the ticket office at Walmer Station but government intervention prevented this.

Options

- 1. Write to the Department of Transport and Southeastern appealing for extended opening hours or alternative arrangements to be made for toilet provision.
- 2. Note the report with no action.



Item: Water testing Kits.

The January meeting of the Climate Emergency Working Group reviewed available Water testing kits. It was previously agreed as part of the budget agreement to allocate £500 toward purchase of water testing kits for use on sea at Walmer.

Following a review of available kits, a suitable kit that was accredited was selected. The cost of these kits would be £840, therefore the Climate Emergency working Group recommends increasing the 2025/26 budget for Water Testing Kits from £500 to £840 with the additional £340 coming from unallocated reserves.

Recommendation of CEWG To increase the budget to £840.

- 1. To recommend increase in budget to £840 to Full Council.
- 2. To make no changes and request that Climate Emergency Working Group seek an alternative solution within the £500 set budget.

Item: Allotment pricing.

Cost of allotments 2024/25: £2255.16 (estimated expected cost)

Income: £2640 (projected)

Further work on the fencing on the side of the bank Campbell road side is likely to need to be completed in the next few years due to erosion. Work to clear the wall of ivy will need to be regularly carried out

Two years ago Walmer Town Council amended the pricing to be inline with Deal Town Council. Previously allotments were set as either large or small and a fixed price was allocated to the size, under the new pricing a price per meter was set and all allotments were re-measured and priced accordingly.

Last year prices were 48p per meter in line with the cost of Deal Town Councils allotments. Deal Town Council is holding it's pricing for 2025/26.

We also offer for £5 per year membership to the SWCAA for £5 per year (cost price) with this allotment holders are given membership to the SWCAA who are a national support group who offer advice, provide a quarterly newsletter and include insurance of the plot.
