#### 4. MATTERS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

Briefing with DDC Climate Change officer James Traynor after invitation offered, this
included information about council emissions, electric vehicles and storage, nature walks
and buying schemes. Mr Traynor was interested in some of the initiatives and information
the council has collated, Cllr Waite Gleave to send documents mentioned to DDC officer.

#### 5. PRIORITIES AND ACTIONS

#### **Transport**

- EV charging points.
  - No update was available for the EV charging points this month.
  - DDC officer informed CEWG that EV point funds Kent 600 and LEVI fund will both be available this year for requests for grants.
  - A total of three cycle routes exist in Dover district., DDC will send a costed plan to make the routes safer for use to KCC to be added to the new DDC walking and cycling plan.

#### **Ongoing projects**

• Thermal Camera Scheme

- Update on numbers for scheme- Noted.
- Request to be made to customers for use of their thermal camera pictures to inform DDC regarding the state of council rented accommodation to help tenants.
- DDC Planning and Housing to be approached regarding council, and other, rented properties, and if there is potential for DDC to make more energy efficient. More information to be put forward via social media once confirmed.

#### Pesticide free towns national movement.

 CEWG to recommend to Full Council, KCC and DDC to achieve weed control without the use of pesticides and using alternative methods.

**RESOLVED** – CEWG recommends to Full Council that we approach DDC and KCC to achieve weed control without pesticides by alternative methods.

#### **Local Nature Recovery Strategy**

#### • Tree Planting

- Admin seeking costings on trees for various sites.
- A&E Committee have approved funding of £2000 for the planting of replacement street cherry trees on Salisbury Road.
- Cllr Waite Gleave applied to Tree Council for 5 fruit trees following consultation with York and Albany Peace Garden group; the application was successful and 5 trees 1.5m tall will be delivered in March. A similar opportunity will be sought for Churchill Avenue Meadow. Cllr Findley to send list of tree funding possibilities.

#### • Churchill Ave:

- It was noted that the Churchill Avenue project has been accepted by the Full Council at the meeting on 10<sup>th</sup> January 2024
- Recommendation to put the contract from DDC before full council at the next meeting.
  - RESOLVED The recommendation be put forward to next full council meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> February 2024
     Proposed by: Cllr Eddy
     Seconded by: Cllr Findley
- Cllr Waite Gleave has been in contact with several groups regarding volunteering for the Churchill Avenue Garden, so far positive responses have been received from schools and guide/scout groups. In addition, several local residents have been interested in forming a group similar to the York and Albany committee.
- The Management Plan has been deferred to a later meeting once a community group has formed and chosen its committee.

#### Walmer And Deal Action for Swifts Project

 The project is currently looking into people to put the swift boxes up, including the need for safety and insurance.

- Green grant application application approved at A&E 17/1/24 and passed to WTC full council for February- Noted
- A suggestion was made for WTC to adopt the swift as the Flagship Species for the council similar to other town councils. Cllr Findley to write a small memo for Full Council.

#### **Waste Reduction**

- The plastic reduction information is to be edited and resubmitted at the next CEWG Meeting.
- WTC continues to seek DDC help with funding and installation of water refill stations-Noted
- CEWG to lobby Kent Resource Partnership, KCC, DDC and MP to map recycling locations.
- Discussion on possibility of WTC collecting tetrapacks in a gabon cage at events.
- Suggestions were made to contact ACE Recycling regarding the addition to new recycling banks in Walmer.
- Suggestions were made to promote DDC Litter Lotto; encourage public to sort their waste more effectively.
- The rest of the waste reduction and invitations to community groups was deferred to the next CEWG meeting.

If possible could the following be discussed at the next meeting or passed to the relevant person(s)?

In particular, the points at Deal and Walmer Rugby Club. I note that previous meeting minutes indicate that their use has been monitored/discussed.

I would like know if the regular restrictions on their use have been incorporated into the figures?

Out of the four spaces 1-2 are regularly parked in by others and the house adjacent to 2 spaces had scaffolding for a significant amount of time.

I have added some recent pictures for ease (not to out the van/car users).



As you can see with the 2 x7kw chargers blocked users are forced to use 22kw and the parking adjacent to the spaces cause mayhem if they are not parked tight.


Users of chargers have to pull in tight to the wet, scratchy verge and either navigate through it to access the charger or leave the charger sticking out to main route of traffic.

I like others do avoid using when games are on as understandably attendees park in the spaces regardless of fuel type, however, it is important to note that figures may be far from accurate due to considerable barriers in using.

Approximately two years ago a similar problem was brought up to the council. Officers looked into the possibility of Enforcement but were unable to find anyone willing to take up the contract due to the small number of spaces. Therefore the decision was made that ClIrs that were nearby would put a leaflet on the cars. (See Below)

Good afternoon,

So typically we carry trees around 6/7ft which could be easily staked if needed. The trees in your first list would typically all be £49.90 (we can do a discount for you of 20% so they'll come down to £39.92) as a potted tree, cheaper if we can get them bare root but that window of opportunity is closing quickly! Of the list given we currently only have the Rowan (Sorbus auc.) on site, we can certainly get the others in for you but we would need to do that quite quickly.

We do have types/sports of the list, for example crab apple is Malus sylvestris, we don't have that form but we have 4 other types of Malus.

With regards to the fruit trees, we have around 10 varieties of apple, 5 cherries, 5 plums... they're all £39.90 potted, again slightly cheaper bare root and we do have lots of varieties both potted and bare root on site.

We can get Medlar and Quince in for you and again price wise will be around the same. We do have Kent Cob on site at the moment as a bare root tree (we can pot it for you) and they're currently £25

Recommendation: That WTC instigates a Walmer Against Plastic Pollution (WAPP) campaign in summer 2024, to include the simple, cost-effective, or cost-free, actions listed in the report below. Part 1 of 2.

Report: With Walmer TC doing more than many level 1 councils to bring the community together with events including hospitality, Walmer TC is in a position to help residents, organisations and businesses within our parish and visitors to our parish reduce the plastic part of their carbon footprint. With greater public awareness of the negative effects on health of nanoplastics on our bodies, we expect this campaign to be popular with Walmer residents and visitors.

Actions relating to cleaning up plastic pollution and encouraging more of the public to sort and recycle more to be put on agenda of CEWG March 28<sup>th</sup> to be discussed and decided.

(Actions relating to helping WalmerTC & Walmer organisations to cut our parish's consumption of fossil-fuel derived plastics: to be held over for the CEWG agenda of May 2024, to be discussed and decided at May meeting.)

Actions to clean up plastic pollution.

- Support the 5 annual DealWithIt Walmer beach cleans with publicity. (see overleaf)
- Organise a WAPP litter pick inland in Walmer, during annual Great British Spring Clean each year (in 2024 15<sup>th</sup> 31 March 2024). This could be an annual joint WalmerTC / PickDealClean event.
- Explicitly thank DealWithIt and PickDealClean for the work their volunteers do in Walmer.
- Create a Single A4 Information sheet, for residents reporting concerns about litter / plastic pollution; likely to involve referring public to <a href="https://www.dover.gov.uk/Environment/Environmental-Crime/Environmental-Crime/Environmental-Crime.aspx">https://www.dover.gov.uk/Environment/Environmental-Crime/Environmental-Crime/Environmental-Crime.aspx</a>

Actions to encourage more of the public to sort and 'recycle' plastic waste more often.

- A drop-off point for tetrapaks at back of WTC office; cllr SWG of CEWG to take to Whitfield Tesco carpark to put in <a href="https://ace-uk.co.uk">https://ace-uk.co.uk</a> recycling container once a month. To note: Avoiding tetrapaks, preferring glass as liquid containers is much more sustainable, however we view it as constructive to offer help. Lightweight metal container needed, eg Gabion like this <a href="https://www.vidaxl.co.uk/e/vidaxl-gabion-wall-with-covers-galvanised-steel-100x20x100-cm/8719883592138.html">https://www.vidaxl.co.uk/e/vidaxl-gabion-wall-with-covers-galvanised-steel-100x20x100-cm/8719883592138.html</a> The WTC drop-off for tetrapaks & info sheets on WAPP could also be available at the WTC gazebo during events on Walmer Green.
- Publicise / Share twice a year to public, on our FB WTC page, information on how to select what waste goes in

- Publicise household battery recycling near Walmer, at Coop shop Mill Hill. (recycle-more.co.uk search for CT14
   70U)
- Publicise / share <a href="https://www.kent.gov.uk/environment-waste-and-planning/rubbish-and-recycling/device-recycling-scheme">https://www.kent.gov.uk/environment-waste-and-planning/rubbish-and-recycling/device-recycling-scheme</a>

To note: Point 1. Some level 1 coastal councils such as Porlock in Somerset have teamed up with Surfers against Sewage on time-consuming processes to sign up all organisations within their parish to become 'Plastic-Free'. Community groups locally in Walmer and Deal have tried a Plastic Free Deal 2018-2022 and found it very time-consuming and heavy on administration so not effective. Point 2. After research, we don't recommend using Terracycle.com to collect, e.g. crisp/snack packets, as, despite pretence of recycling, packets go to incineration, same as with Veolia greytopped bins.

I'm afraid we are no longer implementing any new collection points under our fully funded scheme. Should any new collection points be implemented, this would need to be done as part of a separate agreement with the collection contractor, Printwaste Recycling.
